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“Although” Writing Challenge



One of the most effective ways to improve your writing and make sentences more complex is by starting them with the subordinating conjunction "although."

This technique creates a subordinate clause (also called a dependent clause), which sets up a contrast or prepares the reader for an unexpected turn of events.

By placing the "although" clause first, you create anticipation, leading the reader slowly toward the main point of the sentence.

Key Rule: When you start a sentence with "although," you must place a comma after the first clause to separate it from the main idea.

Here is an example:

Although the cake looked delicious, it tasted like pine needles.
